

Creation

19th May 1802
A new "granit mass":
the Legion of Honour

Before 1804, no insignia was given to the recipients







Institution of the "Great decoration"


At first, limited to 60 great officers

Great Eagle insignia and star of Marshal Jean Lannes Coll. MNLHOC

"Grand cordon", "Grande decoration", Grand Aigle", which name for this dignity?

August 1807
In a letter to Marshal Brune:

"The great decoration and star of the Legion of honour will now take the name of Great Eagle of the Legion of Honour instead of Great sash"



A new dignity for a new elite?

Nominations:

- French: 85 Great Eagles (+ Napoleon)
- Foreigners: 71 (including 15 sovereigns)



A new dignity for a new elite?

French nominations: 85 greats eagles

- 8 members of the imperial Family

- 18 civilians

- 59 military

- **1805**: **58** (including 49 for the promotion of the 2nd February 1805)

- 1806 : 6

- 1807 : 6

- 1809 : 7

- 1811 : 1 (The King of Rome)


- 1813 : 4

- 1815 : 3

A new dignity for a new elite?

A perfect symbol of Napoleon's new elite: an elite of merit and of the function, mix of the new and old societies

- Around 25 are issue of the low bourgeoisie or of humble origin
- At least 40 will be made duke or prince
 - Average age: 45 years old(only 11 are younger than Napoleon)



Military Great Eagles

- 50 were engaged or went to military schools before 1789
- 8 fought during the US independence war (and 2 the Seven years War)
- 9 joined the Army during the French Revolution



Thanks to archives research we can suppose that three Great Eagle were appointed during the "Cent jours":

- -Lucien Bonaparte
- Pierre Claude Pajol
- -Lazare Carnot



Foreign recipients

71 Foreigners received the Great Eagle, including 15 sovereigns

"This Great Decoration also have the goal to link our institutions to the institutions of the different States in Europe"



After the fall of the First Empire, among 85 French Great Eagles:

- 17 died and 12 were exiled or not loyal to Louis XVIII
- 56 might have modified their insignia

Almost 48 Great Eagles insignia known today:

- 32 are well attributed (including 9 modified after 1814-1815)
 - 10 in French National Collections (including 3 modified)
 - 14 in private collections
 - 8 in Foreign National Collections
- 16 are non attributed (including 6 modified)
